I. WEEKDAY IMMERSION IN NURSING INFORMATICS (WIND)

Carol J Bickford PhD RN-BC and Kathleen Smith MScEd RN-BC FHIMS

Thursday June 23 2011 8:00 am – 5:00 pm and Friday June 24 2011 8:00 am – 4:00 pm

This two day workshop is designed for nurses who want to expand or clarify their working knowledge of nursing informatics. New informatics nurses will understand the breadth of knowledge and skills expected of the role. Nurse educators and staff nurses on implementation teams will particularly benefit from this course which will offer pragmatic information for their teaching and/or practice. Nurse faculty will find the course useful in understanding the informatics systems in places students have clinical experience. The focus is on technological trends and issues in practice facing the nursing professional. A comprehensive examination of nursing informatics theories, impact of human factors, systems analysis and design approaches will be discussed. Methods for managing both information databases and systems as well as the evaluation of computer technology systems will be included. The content is provided by two well known certified informatics nurses. In addition, this course provides a comprehensive review for the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC) Nursing Informatics Certification Exam. Extensive course materials, as well as a subscription to Computers In Nursing (CIN) are provided with this course. **Enrollment is limited to 50 people.**

II. Cloud Computing: Implications For Healthcare And Higher Education

Diane Skiba PhD FAAN FACMI and Dennis Crain MN

In this preconference workshop, we will sort through the definitions including an awareness of public and private clouds. We will lay the foundation for understanding the benefits of cloud computing. Faculty will examine uses of the cloud in healthcare. The focus will be on clinical, research and higher education applications. There will also be an examination of the opportunities, obstacles and challenges of cloud computing. Presentation will also include a brainstorming session with participants to project uses in nursing and healthcare.

III. Meaningful Use Stage 1: Overcoming Challenges To Implementing What Really Works In Clinical Transformation

Jayshiro Tashiro PhD BA BSN RN, Robert Tashiro and Dr Joanne Curry

A half-day workshop that provides participants with an analysis of the challenges faced during implementation of Meaningful Use Stage 1 Criteria. Simply described, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 defined "meaningful use" that healthcare providers need to demonstrate as patterns of application of certified EHR technologies and that such usage could be measured significantly in quality and in quantity. Three main components of Meaningful Use were outlined:

1. The use of an electronic health record (HER) in a meaningful manner.
2. The use of certified EHR technology for electronic exchange of health information to improve quality of health care.
3. The use of certified EHR technology to submit clinical quality and other measures.

Of course, these components have been expanded into Meaningful Use Matrices with specific objectives that must be attained within staged frameworks of implementation. Our approach will be to present the challenges faced by hospital staff, with a special focus on implications for Nursing services and education across the spectrum from pre-professional training through continuing education for advanced clinical practice. We will engage participants in discussion of challenges observed in hospitals and exploration of practical solutions to address the factors shaping these challenges. The workshop is designed as three sessions, each about 45 minutes in length.

IV. Effective Use of Social Media in Healthcare and Academic Settings and by Consumers

Diane Skiba PhD FAAN FACMI and Helen Connors PhD RN DrPs(Hon) FAAN

The use of social media is rapidly becoming a part of our culture. Reports indicate the increasing use of social media in education and in health care. Social media also serves as the primary platform for consumers to gather health information and to manage their health and healthcare in the future. Facebook, Twitter and YouTube are now methods to communicate, share information and ideas, collaborate, and market services. This workshop will examine the impact of social media in the education of healthcare professionals. The impact of social media use by health care consumers will also be examined. During this hands on workshop participants will learn how to use social media in interaction with staff, students and patients. Participants will learn best practices for use of social media and will develop a strategy for use within their organization. Strengths and cautions in using social media will be discussed. At the completion of the workshop participants will be able to effectively use many forms of social media in their individual settings.

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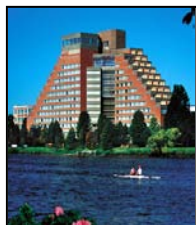
